Polar Bridges: Closing the gap between polar science, research, indigenous knowledge, and polar education.

Summary

Building on historical precedent of combining polar science and education conferences (IPY2010-Oslo, IPY2012-Montreal, ISAR-4, ASSW2015 and ICARP III, DAVOS2018) PEI's 6th International Conference and Workshop for polar educators took place within the Arctic Science Summit Week alongside the APECS World Summit and the Indigenous Pavillion Program, which offered polar educators a unique opportunity to contribute to discussions about Arctic research priorities for the coming decade. Research and education presentations, activities and events facilitated networking, nurtured knowledge exchange, fostered partnership and collaboration among educators, arctic researchers, and indigenous participants—thus bridging the gap between polar knowledge, local and global action through polar education practice.

Out of the total number of registrants for ASSW and ICARPIV, 108 indicated their participation in PEI's Polar Bridges conference sessions. The *drop-in* nature of the greater ASSW science conference posed a challenge to accurately determine the exact number of consistent attendees across all PEI sessions, but anecdotal evidence was that the room was generally robust with attendees and activity. The advantage to this format was that PEI attracted new and unexpected contacts, some of whom have now joined PEI as Council members, mentors potential partners in upcoming projects including the new Polar Resource Book and lead up to the next IPY.

The Project Goal

Support by IASC Cryosphere, Marine and Social and Human Working Groups, guided science education themes for the 6th International workshop;

- A focus on place-based and land-based indigenous and non-indigenous approaches to learning about the Arctic.
- Understanding the earth's cryosphere better, including the world's water towers of the 3rd pole,
- Engaging audiences in impacts of plastic pollution and human behaviour on the polar oceans and people

Goals

The IASC cross cutting award was specifically limited to <u>travel support for indigenous participants</u>. Building on our continuing commitment to connecting communities, and with advice from IASC, we divided the award of \in 7,000 into 3 travel bursaries of \in 2,300







The aim was to find mentors to help guide and plan, shaping outcomes of our activities and events at ICARPIV.

PEI 6th biennial international Conferences and Workshops for Polar Educators

Through our international workshops PEI Council strives to help all educators enhance and share their awareness, understanding, and knowledge of the Arctic environment and its significance in global climate and environmental change, **bridging the gaps** between scientific research and international educational practices, global climate and local impacts and diverse epistemologies and cultural practices.

During this time of environmental and societal crisis, each successful knowledge exchange between educators and the international polar research and indigenous knowledge holding communities helps our community of practice engage a more







extended and diverse audience with credible learning and communication tools and resources for environmental stewardship, monitoring, mitigation, adaptation and creativity for a more hopeful future.

We have connected with an average of 80 participants at our workshops In 2013, 2015, 2017, 2019, 2022 who represent. At ASSW2025, PEI2025 places emphasis on helping Arctic researchers and knowledge holders understand how educators can help broaden the reach of Arctic research priorities and needs using a hands-on, activity based approach.
